Ethnic Studies

Associate in Arts Degree

Ethnic Studies......18 units

The Ethnic Studies program provides an interdisciplinary academic curriculum that provides students with an in-depth analysis of the rich life experiences of African American, Chicano/a, and Latino/a/x people, and in comparison to the experiences of other people of color. The program emphasizes the comparative and transborder study of race, ethnicity, and indigeneity. Major areas of study include history, culture, politics, contemporary social issues, literature, and the arts. In addition to acquiring a critical understanding of social and racial justice issues, students who take Ethnic Studies classes will gain the necessary skills to pursue career opportunities in education, public health, social services, government, community-based agencies, and beyond.

An Associate in Arts Degree may be earned by completing a minimum of 60 units of degree credit coursework, including the major requirements and breadth requirements, with a minimum grade point average of 2.0. Students must complete all courses for the major with a grade of C or better.

Associate in Science Degree Computer Science......20 Units

The associate in science in computer science is designed as a two-year curricular pathway that offers students a broad general education while integrating an in-depth study of computer science. Students will be prepared to assume entry level positions in business and industry. Many of the courses are also applicable toward advanced levels of study. To earn a degree, students must complete each course used to meet a major requirement with a "C" grade or higher and complete all general education requirements as listed in the catalog. Students who intend to transfer to a four-year program in computer science should consult with a counselor regarding additional pre-requisite requirements.

Associate in Arts Transfer Degree Economics22-25 Units

The Associate in Arts in Economics for Transfer Degree is designed to prepare students for transfer into the CSU system to complete a baccalaureate degree in Economics or a similar major. It is designed for students interested in preparing for advanced degrees in Economics, Business, or Law, and for those students concerned with the economic behavior of consumers, businesses, and governments. Economics majors have a wide variety of career opportunities in business, law, journalism, education, politics, finance and banking, government, public and private overseas service, and labor leadership. Many economics majors go on to pursue graduate study in a related professional area, such as law, business, or public administration. The Associate in Arts in Economics for Transfer Degree is designed to provide students a clear pathway to the CSU economics major and completion of the economics baccalaureate degree, to grant guaranteed admission to a CSU to a similar major, with junior standing, and the ability to complete their remaining requirements within 60 semester or 90 quarter units.

Pursuant to SB1440, section 66746, a student must complete the following requirements in order to earn an AA-T in Economics:

- Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units of degreeapplicable courses,
- Minimum overall grade point average of 2.0,
- Minimum grade of "C" (or "P") for each course in the major, and
- Completion of IGETC and/or CSU GE-Breadth.

The Economics AA-T Degree requires a total of 22-25 major units of required courses and restricted electives in the categories below as indicated.
