Legal Updates

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)

- Decision by the U.S. Southern District of Texas:
 - o DACA is an unlawful program
 - 2022 DACA Rule attempting to solidify DACA is also unlawful
- The case is now being appealed to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals by the Biden Administration.
- Current State of DACA:
 - DACA renewals can continue
 - Advance Parole for DACA can continue
 - Appeals for DACA renewal denials can continue



Legal Updates

Temporary Protected Status (TPS)

- Program that allows migrants whose home countries are considered unsafe the right to live and work in the United States for a temporary, but extendable, period of time.
- Current Designated Countries:
 - Afghanistan; Burma (Myanmar); Cameroon; El Salvador;
 Ethiopia; Haiti; Honduras; Nepal; Nicaragua; Somalia; South
 Sudan; Sudan; Syria; Ukraine; Venezuela; Yemen
- Current Extensions (for those who already have TPS):
 - o El Salvador; Haiti; Honduras; Nepal; Nicaragua; Sudan



United States Border Patrol:

In charge of securing the nation's land borders and coastal waters between ports of entry.



Immigration & Customs Enforcement:

Criminal investigations and enforcement of immigration laws to preserve national security and public safety.



Customs & Border Protection (CBP):

In charge of customs and immigration enforcements at U.S. Ports of Entry.



U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Services

In charge of processing immigration and naturalization applications, and establishing policies regarding immigration services.



U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services

Other Agencies

State Level: California Highway Patrol

In charge of safety, service, and security of state highways, and protection for the Governor.

County Level: Contra Costa County Sheriff

In charge of law enforcement at the county level, jails, and work camps.

City Law Enforcement: Local Police Dept.

In charge of public safety at the city level.








Common Immigration Statuses

- Undocumented
- Lawful Permanent Resident
- Non-Immigrant
- U.S. Citizen



Permanent Residency (Adjustment of Status; Family Petitions; Consular Processing)

- Also known as a "Green Card"
- Non-citizens who are lawfully authorized to live permanently in the United States




Asylum

• Protection for those who fear return to their home country and are already in the U.S. or are seeking admission at a port of entry. Generally must submit the application within a year after entry even if still waiting for your court date.



Special Immigrant Juvenile Status

• For unmarried children under age 21 who have been declared dependent on a juvenile court or placed in custody of individual or entity appointed by court



Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)

Self-petition done by spouse, child, or parent of Abusive Permanent Resident or Citizen. Eligible for Lawful Permanent Residency.

U-Visa: Victims of a qualifying crime

4 year humanitarian visa for survivors of a qualifying crime

T-Visa: Victims of severe trafficking

4 year humanitarian visa for survivors of human trafficking.

EVERYONE HAS RIGHTS UNDER THE U.S. CONSTITUTION



Your Rights



To NOT Disclose

Where you were born or how you entered the U.S.



To NOT open the door

ICE needs a warrant signed by a judge to enter. Do not open if no warrant!

To NOT sign

Never sign documents without first speaking to a lawyer. If you do not understand it, do not sign it!

RED CARD FOR ICE

Usted tiene derechos constitucionales.

- NO ABRA LA PUERTA SI UN AGENTE DEL SERVICIO DE INMIGRACION ESTA TOCANDO A LA PUERTA.
- NO CONTESTE NINGUNA PREGUNTA DEL AGENTE DEL SERVICIO DE INMIGRACION SI EL TRATA DE HABLAR CON USTED. Usted tiene derecho a mantenerse callado. No tiene que dar su nombre al agente. Si está en el trabajo, pregunte al agente si está libre para salir y si el agente dice que sí, váyase. Usted tiene derecho de hablar con un abogado.
- ENTREGUE ESTA TARJETA AL AGENTE. NO ABRA LA PUERTA

I do not wish to speak with you, answer your questions, or sign or hand you any documents based on my 5th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution.

I do not give you permission to enter my home based on my
4th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution
unless you have a warrant to enter, signed by a judge or
magistrate with my name on it that you slide under the door. I
do not give you permission to search any of my belongings
based on my 4th Amendment rights.

I choose to exercise my constitutional rights.

These cards are available to citizens and noncitizens alike.

CONTACT WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT

CONTACT WITH ICE OR DHS

Driver License

If asked by police, you must show your License.





In Custody

Immediately request an attorney and remain silent

Police in California cannot askfor proof of immigration status

Cooperate, BUT

Right to not disclose info of where you were born





Custody

Call your emergency contact and attorney to inform them of the situation

IF ICE ENTERS YOUR WORKPLACE



Do NOT Consent

If ICE does not have a warrant, do not consent to enter the workplace nor to arrest anyone in your workplace.



Know the Law

Under CA law, employers cannot turn over employee records or voluntarily allow immigration agents to enter non-public areas of the workplace without a judicial warrant.



No Warrant: Ask Them to Leave

CALMLY ask them to leave and advise workers that they have the right to remain silent and do not have to answer their questions.

IF ICE ENTERS YOUR WORKPLACE



With Warrant:

Make sure that the warrant has the correct address for your workplace and that it is signed by a judge

Agents cannot search areas or items not listed in the warrant!



Stay Calm

DO NOT run or direct others to run. This can lead to dangerous pursuits.



Call the Rapid Response Hotline in your Area

Fact: The Contra Costa Community College District is a Sanctuary for undocumented students. CCC will not release student information to ICE without a judicial warrant.

SAVE - MEMORIZE - SHARE



SCENARIO ONE

Angela, an undocumented student attending Contra Costa College, is worried that I.C.E. will ask Contra Costa College for her immigration status.

What can we tell her?



SCENARIO TWO

Jose, a DACA recipient, is stopped for speeding. The police officer asks for a green card or other proof of immigration status.

How should Jose proceed?

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PROTECT YOURSELF AND OTHERS?



Prepare an Immigration File

Store all important documents in a folder or safe, and let a family member or close friend know where it is. Memorize that person's phone number!





Records

Gather records relating to arrests or convictions, no matter if you think they are old convictions or you believe they are expunged from your record.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PROTECT YOURSELF AND OTHERS?



Make a Plan For Family

Who will care for your children or family? Find someone who is willing to help you should it be needed. Memorize their number!





Children

Assure children they will be taken care of, without worrying them of course. Make sure they know who will care for them and have children memorize the person's number.

Save Money

Save money for a bond, should you need it. Save money for family and children as well!







FREE IMMIGRATION LEGAL CONSULTATIONS



- Free confidential immigration consults on campus.
- Representation in deportation matters (limited)
- Legal assistance for naturalization, U-visa, family petitions, DACA, TPS, Green card renewal/replacement, etc.
- Citizenship workshops
- Classes to study for your citizenship interview

AVOID FRAUD!

- Only get legal advice from attorneys and DOJ accredited representatives, <u>NOT NOTARIES</u>.
 An attorney will not be offended if you ask for their license number. To look up if a person is an attorney licensed to practice law in CA, visit <u>calbar.ca.gov</u>
- If something is too good to be true, it probably is.
- Notaries are NOT allowed to practice law in the United States.





UNDOCUALLY

HOW TO BE AN UNDOCUALLY!



- Be the person someone else can rely on if they are taken into custody
- Stay informed of the legal updates that might impact your immigrant community
- If you are witnessing an ICE raid, do not bodily interfere with the detention
- You do have the right to record
- If you know who is being detained, alert their family members or friends and call THE HOTLINE
